On Thursday 2<sup>nd</sup> February, we published Stable Homes, Built on Love – an implementation strategy and consultation, backed by £200m additional investment.

The strategy sets out a vision to rebalance children's social care away from costly crisis intervention to more meaningful and effective early support.

It sets out actions that seek to:

- Address urgent issues facing children and families now
- Lay the foundations for whole system reform
- Set national direction for change

We will reform in phases, investing **£200m** over the next two years.

After two years we will refresh this strategy, scaling up new approaches we have tested and bringing forward legislation (subject to parliamentary time).



## There are six pillars of reform



Pillar 1: Family Help provides the right support at the right time so that children can thrive with their families



Pillar 2: A decisive multi-agency child protection system



Pillar 3: Unlocking the potential of family networks



Pillar 4: Putting love, relationships and a stable home at the heart of being a child in care



Pillar 5: A valued, supported and highly-skilled social worker for every child who needs one



Pillar 6: A system that continuously learns and improves, and makes better use of evidence and data



## We will provide a highly skilled social worker for every child who needs one and build a system that learns and improves

## Pillar 5: A valued, supported and highly-skilled social worker for every child who needs one.

We will better value, train and support social workers through:

- High-quality career development. An Early Career
  Framework (ECF), giving social workers more training and
  support. Social Work England will inspect all initial education
  routes for social workers by 2025.
- **Improved retention**. Support local authorities to improve working conditions and tackle workload pressures.
- Reducing the cost and reliance on agency social workers.
   Consult on whether to set national rules on agency usage, including potential price caps.
- Boost social worker recruitment. Explore ways to support the recruitment of up to 500 additional child and family social worker apprentices nationally.

## Pillar 6: A system that continuously learns and improves, and makes better use of evidence and data

Provide national direction for the system setting out its aims and how we will deliver reform:

- Introduce a Children's Social Care National Framework: to set out the outcomes children's social care should deliver.
- To help implement the National Framework:
  - Children's Social Care Dashboard to support learning by providing information and data on how the outcomes are being achieved.
  - **Practice Guides** to provide the best available evidence on important practice issues.
- **Improve use of technology and data**: publish a data strategy by the end of 2023 providing a long-term plan to transform data in children's social care.
- Align inspection: work with Ofsted to ensure inspection is aligned to the National Framework and reflects policy aims.
- Enhance improvement and intervention: improve the evidence base around what works to effectively support "drifting authorities" (consecutive Requires Improvement judgements) and pilot a Regional Improvement Commissioner.
- Before the next Spending Review, aim to update, publish and consult on a new formula for children and young people's services funding provided to local authorities.

### Workforce – recruitment & retention

- Agency rules sector loves them but are we sure?
- Existential crisis for social work unique contribution?
- Dangers of care management as default
- Where NAAS would have taken SW and now losing ground?
- ECF clarity of purpose and what do we want to achieve?
- Length of ASYE & implications of a 5 year pathway
- Skills rather than timeframes determining progression?
- Evidence base for knowledge & skill
- Local v national PSWs & DCSs

## The National Framework, Dashboard & Working Together

- Purpose, Principles, Outcomes seem to be uncontentious: offers clarity & chimes with common understanding – have other agencies paid enough attention?
- A 3<sup>rd</sup> enabler of multiagency working needed
- Sense of own agency as a CSC practitioner
- The authoritative voice on evidence
- The real purpose of the Dashboard TRANSPARENCY
- Accountability for shared outcomes e.g. attendance (Virtual Schools)
- How will it drive change if we do this already? Clear Family First Policy
- No ambition to unrealistic (confused position)
- Alignment with inspection
- The role of the Practice Supervisor & 1st Line Manager
- Who can do what under Section 17 & Section 47 local autonomy?
- Decision making matrix essential? Or local delegation?
- The bottle neck & delegated authority
- Separate Child Protection Standards do we need them?
- Specificity for Safeguarding Partnerships

## Other dilemmas & deliberations

- Care Standards one set focused on children's welfare
- The role of residential care & the Ofsted estimate JM's £800 million saving (if care plans are correct)
- The tussle between S.17 help and all that comes before (reclaiming the original intention but S.10 paramount need)
- Consent & subtle coercion; Role of front door safety? support? gateway or service?
- Interface between help & protection the how (Burn out, 2 tier SW, the need for strong investigative lens)
- Clear Blue Water likelihood of significant harm
- Schools as 4<sup>th</sup> Safeguarding Partner
- Recognising Kinship & the sanctity of private family life (SGOs, CAOs, & new burdens)
- Prescription of family decision making mechanisms (too early; too easy)
- RCCs.....the jury is out for sure
